A Collection of the General Library

(included in the records of 50-year history of Imperial University of Tokyo)

"Matsu no Sakae" (1889) is a rare material in the General Library with the subtitle, "Marriage of the Shogun's daughter to the Kaga Family".

This is a nishiki-e, woodblock print, by Utagawa Kunisada III. Including his imagination, he depicted the scene in 1827 when a princess called Yo-hime (also known as Yasu-hime), the 21st daughter of the 11th Tokugawa Shogun, Ienari, married the 13th lord of the Kaga Domain, Maeda Nariyasu. "Akamon" (the Red Gate), one of the symbols of the University of Tokyo, was built to welcome Yo-hime at that time. The illustration of this Princess, dressed in a pure white wedding attire, passing through the Akamon in a lavish procession conveys the splendor of the time to this day. The reason that the Yo-hime's wedding procession in 1827 was chosen as the theme of this work in 1889 is considered to be because this year was the 300th year since Tokugawa Ieyasu entered Edo in 1590, and the 300th anniversary fest of the foundation of Tokyo was held. For the University of Tokyo, this is a valuable illustrated historical document that tells the origin of Akamon.

Message from the University Librarian

The University of Tokyo Libraries' collection had reached 10 million books and journals in the fiscal year 2023. This is the first university library in Japan holding a collection of more than 10 million volumes.



The University of Tokyo has 3 main libraries, General Library, Komaba Library, Kashiwa Library, and 27 departmental libraries, respectively placed in departments, graduate schools or research institutions, etc. These 30 libraries, which accrete as "one collaborate working system" and provide services, is "University of Tokyo Library System" (hereinafter referred to as "UTokyo Library System"), and the "10 million books/journals" are the combined collections from these 30 libraries.

UTokyo Library System was established in 1877 on the campus of three departments of Law, Science, and Literature in Kanda Hitotsubashi. The library totally held approximately 54,000 volumes: approximately 28,000 volumes from these three departments and 26,000 volumes from the "Yobimon" (university preparatory school) of this University. The department of Medicine also had a book room inherited from Tokyo Igakko (Tokyo Medical School). Since then, as the university expanded with the establishment of new faculties, graduate schools and research institutes, libraries were also established in each department. However, the Great Kanto Earthquake in 1923 burned many of the libraries' materials to ashes. The building of the current General Library was rebuilt with a lot of support in 1928. However, even after that, several departments were damaged by air raids during the Pacific War, and several departments had to evacuate their library collections. In the postwar period, General Library was once sealed off due to the University of Tokyo conflict, and then there were also damaged by the Great East Japan Earthquakes.

During this time, while the mission to support learning, education, and research activities throughout the university has not changed, the roles and functions expected of UTokyo Library System have changed and diversified along with the development of the university and the social environment. To date, UTokyo Library System has realized the university-wide common expense system for the purchase of journals and other materials in order to maintain a stable supply of basic academic information, and has endeavored to enrich the student books that contribute to learning and education. In addition to expanding and maintaining paper collections, we also maintain e-resources (e-journals, e-books, and databases). The convenience of these e-resources, being able to use anytime and anywhere, has been reaffirmed during the COVID-19 pandemic, and there is a demand for further improvement in the future.

Furthermore, in order to widely disseminate the world-class research results produced at the University of Tokyo both domestically and internationally, and to give back to our society, we have established and been operating the academic institutional repository, "UTokyo Repository", and are also working hard to make academic papers and other materials publicly available and open access. In February 2023, the University of Tokyo formulated "The Policy of the University of Tokyo on Research Data Management and Utilization", and "The University of Tokyo Open Access Policy". Then in February 2024, the national policy was also formulated, and currently reaffirming the library's role in promoting open science and open access.

In addition, we are promoting "UTokyo Digital Archives Development Project" to digitize and disseminate the academic assets held by the University of Tokyo. By aiming to strengthen the foundations that support academic diversity, we are devoting ourselves to create an environment in which the university's rich academic assets can be accessed anytime, anywhere by building a digital archive in collaboration with departments across the university.

The coexistence of such digital data and traditional holdings can also enhance the value of the library. The University of Tokyo's fundamental policy, "UTokyo Compass," is based on the concept of fusion of "humanities and sciences" and "East and West". In addition to that, it can be said that UTokyo Library System also contains the fusion of "tradition and revolution" and without either, this library would not exist.

UTokyo Library System will continue to play its role as the foundation of research and educational activities of the University of Tokyo, the world center of collaborative knowledge creation, and to return its academic assets to society in a new form, and we will continue to make efforts to develop and provide these services. We do hope that all users will fully make use of the library and that we can continue to count on your more understanding and cooperation.

The University of Tokyo Library Charter

The University of Tokyo (hereinafter referred to as "this university") has established University of Tokyo Library System (hereinafter referred to as "UTokyo Library System") as an indispensable university-wide organization for learning, education, and research, and making it a center for collecting, preserving, and organizing the intellectual heritage of humanity, and the hub for disseminating newly created academic knowledge to the world.

In order to fulfill this duty, UTokyo Library System plays a role as an academic information infrastructure that supports learning, education and research activities at this university, and as one of the centers for the collection, preservation and dissemination of academic knowledge in Japan, contributes to the enhancement of the national academic research infrastructure, and also acts as a center for international collaboration and cooperation, serving the world's academic community by conducting academic information exchanges with academic institutions around the world.

The Commitment of University of Tokyo Library System

1. UTokyo Library System has a combination of learning support functions, research support functions, and preservation functions. General Library, Komaba Library, and Kashiwa Library provide all students of this university a place for studying, acquisition of comprehensive education, and development their intellectual character, and thus play a central role in providing learning support on each campus. Departmental libraries primarily support researches at this university, and also provide learning support functions according to the characteristics of each department.
2. UTokyo Library System will collect, preserve, and organize various academic information necessary for the development of learning, education, and research at this University, and makes it available for the users of both inside and outside the University as widely as possible depending on the nature of the materials, while responsibly passing on the valuable intellectual heritage of humanity that it holds to future generations.
3. UTokyo Library System will provide various types of academic information necessary for learning and acquiring education for all students throughout this university, and will maintain facilities, equipment, staffs and information to enable effective use of such information.

4. UTokyo Library System will make ceaseless efforts for improving its professional capabilities and the sophistication of its information systems so that all members of this university can share and effectively utilize the growing amount of academic information from around the world.
5. UTokyo Library System will disseminate various types of accumulated academic information and the expertise to effectively utilize it in an appropriate form both domestically and internationally.

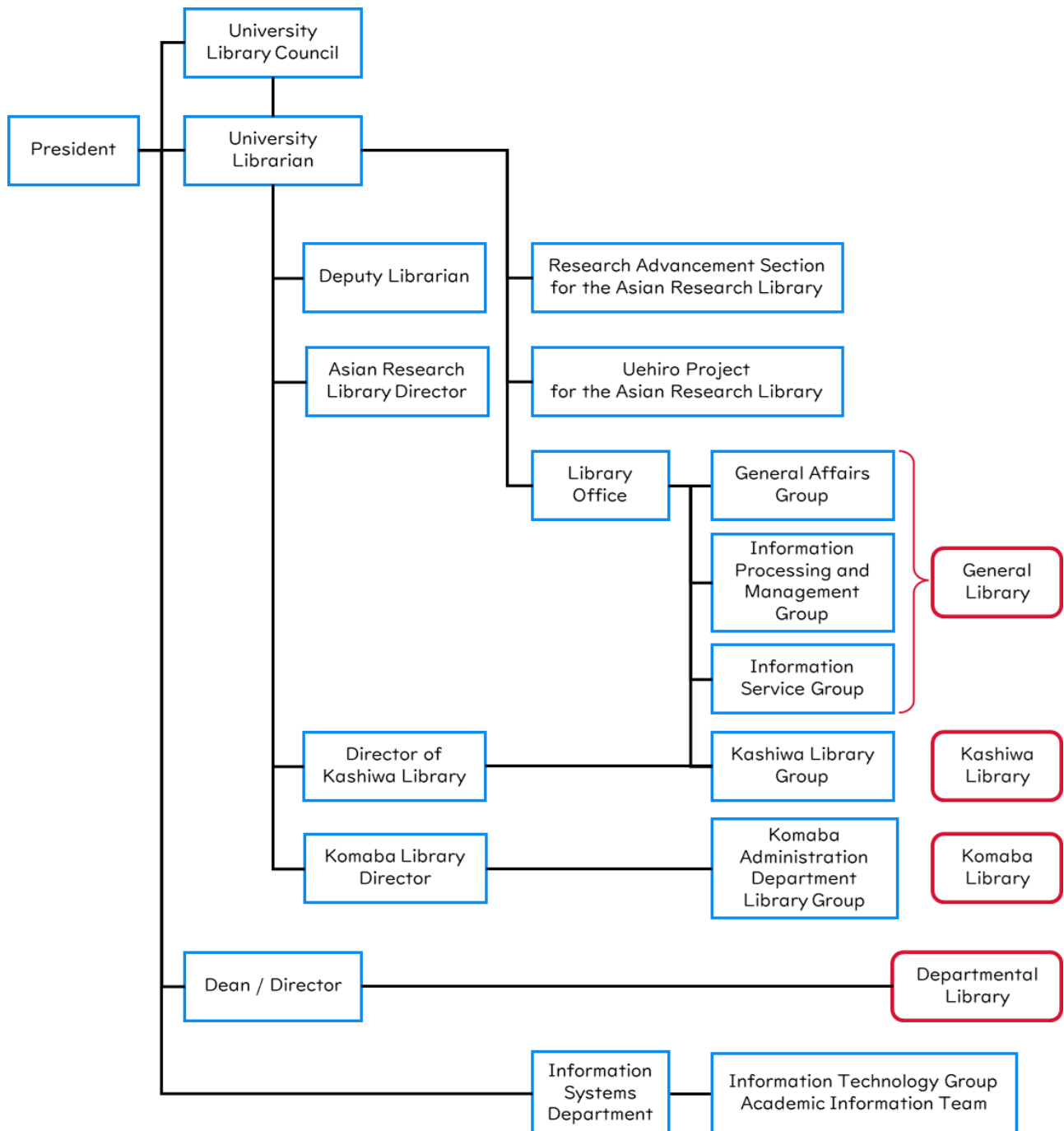

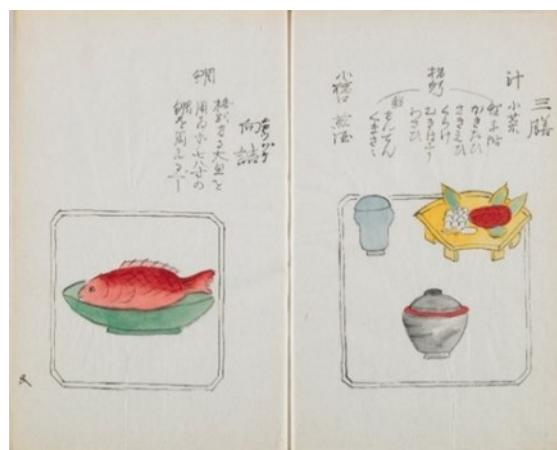

Nanki Collection	Approx. 96,000	Former collection of the Kishu Tokugawa family, which can be considered an accumulation of various private collections. A plaque with calligraphy by Tokugawa Yoshinobu has also been preserved.
Ogai Collection	Approx. 19,000 copies	Former collections of Mori Ogai (1862-1922), mainly books of history and literature, but also biographies, old maps of the Edo period, and Western books that were likely collected by him during his studies in Germany.
Renga Haikaisho Shusei (Shachiku, Chikurei, Chiju Collections)	Approx. 6,600	Renga Haikai Sho collected by haiku poets Ohno Shachiku (1872-1913), Tsunoda Chikurei (1857-1919), and Okano Chiju (1860-1932), respectively.
Tanaka Yoshio Collection	Approx. 6,000	Natural history, exposition-related materials and others collected by Baron Tanaka Yoshio (1838-1916), a naturalist of the Meiji period.



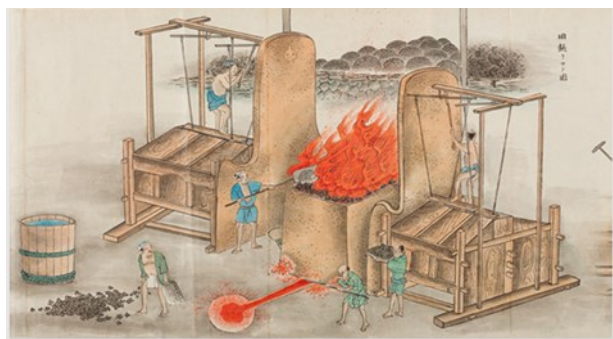
Inuoumono zuzetsu. Nanki Collection

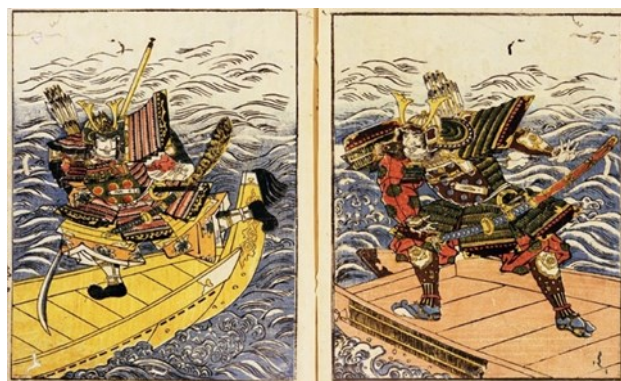

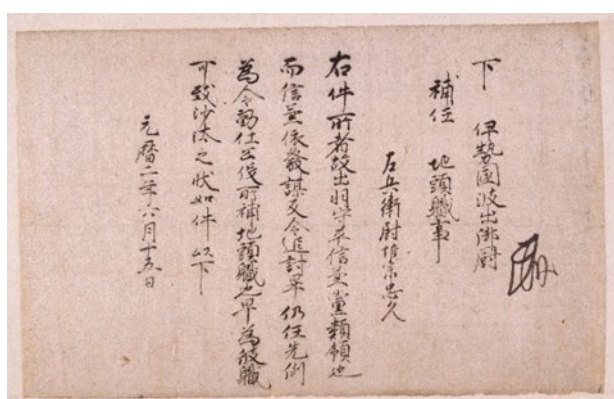

"UTokyo Digital Archive Portal" is operated by "UTokyo Digital Archives Development Project" implemented mainly by UTokyo Library System, The University Museum, The University of Tokyo Archives, and the Information Technology Center to promote the digitization of academic assets held by departments, labs and others of this university. This portal allows users to search the contents of the University's digital archives in a centralized manner. Some of the collections held by each library are also available on this portal.

Timeline of Library History

1877 Foundation of Tokyo University (Tokyo Daigaku): establishment of four departments, Law, Science, Literature, and Medicine.

The library of the three departments of law, science, and literature are placed in Kanda-Hitotsubashi. (Department of Medicine in Hongo possessed a book room taken over from Tokyo Medical School (Tokyo Igakko).)

1878 A Book Exhibition Room is newly established in Department of Medicine.

1884 The library of the three departments of law, science, and literature are relocated to Hongo.

1886 The Imperial University Order (Teikoku Daigaku Rei) is promulgated.

Rename of Tokyo University Library as Imperial University Library.

1892 The new Imperial University Library building is inaugurated.

1897 Renaming of Imperial University (Teikoku Daigaku) as Tokyo Imperial University (Tokyo Teikoku Daigaku).

Imperial University Library is renamed as Tokyo Imperial University Library.

1923 The university library is completely destroyed by the fire and the most of its collections are burned down in the wake of the Great Kanto Earthquake.

League of Nations adopts a resolution supporting the recovery of the Tokyo Imperial University library collection.

1924 Received a 4 million yen donation from John D. Rockefeller, Jr. for the reconstruction of the university library.

1928 The new library building is completed.

1944 ~45 Evacuation of holdings from the university library, the Faculty of Law, and the Historiographical Institute are proceeded.

Faculty of Medicine, including the Department of Pharmacy also has a record of war-time evacuation while the details of date is unknown.

1945 The most of the wooden buildings of the Faculty of Agriculture are burned down in an air raid and the faculty library lost the collection.

1949 Tokyo Daigaku (The University of Tokyo) is established.

1961 University Librarian, Prof. Kishimoto Hideo presents a plan to reform the university library.

Received funds of 84.6 million yen from the Rockefeller Foundation for the modernization of library functions. Renovation of the university library is carried out (completed in March 1964).

Work begins on the compilation of a union catalog of all university library holdings.

1962 Launch of "Toshokan no Mado" (The University of Tokyo Library bulletin, currently The University of Tokyo Library System Bulletin.)

1968 General Library is sealed off due to the University of Tokyo conflict. (Library is opened to resume its services from the following February.)

1982 University Librarian, Prof. Urata Takeo presents a new plan to reform the General Library.

1986 Library computerized system is launched.

Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) service is started.

1987 Start of the project to retrospectively convert catalog records of Western materials into digital format.

1993 OPAC becomes accessible on campus via the Internet-based UTnet (the University of Tokyo Information Network System).

1995 Start of a 10-year retrospective conversion project (Phase I) of outstanding library holdings.

University of Tokyo Library website becomes available online.

1997 University Library digitization project is started.

2000 Electronic journal (EJ) services is launched on a trial basis. (the official operation begins in 2003.)

2002 Inauguration of Komaba Library.

2004 Establishment of the University of Tokyo Library System's Basic Principles. These principles stipulate that the University of Tokyo Library System (hereinafter referred to as "UTokyo Library System") shall consist of the General Library, the Komaba Library, the Kashiwa Library, and the Departmental Libraries. Then herein the management principle is specified as "one collaborate working system."

2005 Inauguration of the Kashiwa library.

UTokyo Library System starts offering the e-DDS service (Electronic Document Delivery System & Services).

The trial operation of ASK Service is started. (Its official operation begins in August 2006)

2006 Establishment of "the University of Tokyo Library Charter".

UT Repository (currently called UTokyo Repository) is launched.

2008 A ceremony for commemorating the 80th anniversary of the reconstruction of the General Library is held.

2010 Start of the consideration for the New Library Project.

2011 A great number of library materials are damaged by fall out due to the Great East Japan Earthquake, and many affiliate libraries are temporarily closed.

MyOPAC service is launched.

2013 The start of the preparatory work for the General Library Annex in the New Library Project.

2015 Construction work on the General Library Main Building is started in the New Library Project.

2017 Inauguration of the General Library Annex (Library Plaza).

2019 UTokyo Academic Archives Portal website is released.

2020 The opening of the Asian Research Library.

The grand opening ceremony is held for celebrating the completion of construction for the main and annex buildings of the General Library.

2021 Establishment of Research Advancement Section for the Asian Research Library (RASARL).

EZproxy service is started.

2024 As of the end of FY2023, the total number of holdings in the 30 affiliates of UTokyo Library System exceed 10 million.
